



Radicalization, Rehabilitation, Reintegration, and Recidivism Network (4R Network)

To date, there exists no formal, in-prison recidivism reduction program tailored for convicted terrorists, nor a fully realized post-release initiative to support the reentry and reintegration of terrorism-related offenders in the United States.

The Counter Extremism Project (CEP) is leading the 4R Network, which seeks to ensure that every actor tasked directly or indirectly with supervising extremist offenders in-prison and/or in-community in the U.S. has adequate knowledge and access to evidence-based support for their work.

WHO SHOULD JOIN?

Law enforcement and criminal justice professionals, academics, mental health/psychosocial support providers, P/CVE practitioners, former extremists, survivors, religious leaders, and others interested in:

- Contributing to discussion and the development of knowledge related to rehabilitation and reintegration of extremism-related offenders;
- Exploring and sharing best practices on rehabilitation and reintegration; and
- Examining ways in which government and civil society partnerships can better address the needs of extremism-related offenders.
